We were naturally the largest class in school, numbering 43, but when we returned for our sophomore year only 17 appeared, but five new members joined us.





Our next stop was Foochow, China, where we found Irene Howell Iles, wife of the well known Reverend Creed Iles, doing important missionary work there.



In London, England, who do we find but Hassie Smith working in the office of Rollins and Lon's Plugs--Appliances and Corporation as a stenographer.









All too soon our first wonderful year ended and so did P.H.A. but pleasant memories shall linger and be cherished throughout the years to come.


#### The Beginning of Pleasant Hill High School

Mrs. Harriman, our music teacher, conducted an operetta which was given in the spring. The cast included the Sophomore Glee Clubers and various students from other classes.







There were over twenty-five who belonged to the 4-H Club. They took projects that would be of help in the future.


A class election was held for each group; for prettiest girl, most handsome boy, wittiest person, most studious person, most popular person, and best all-round student. This is how the election came out.


Pleasant Hill entered the district tournaments with high hopes, but were downed by Crossville.

Martha Kirby, Barbara Greene, and Johnnie Van Buskirk did a fine job as cheer leaders this year.


Class tournaments came off with a bang this year. Junior boys came out on top after a hard struggle with the seniors. Senior girls won over the freshman girls.








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
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
